  - Up to three of the eight may be courses on Italian cultural topics taken outside of the department with approval from the Italian undergraduate adviser
  - BA paper (if the student wishes to qualify for honors)\*

\*Students writing a BA honors paper may include ITAL 29900 BA Paper Preparation: Italian or ITAL 29901 Academic Research and Writing as one of their upper-level courses. To qualify for honors in the major, students must have an overall GPA of 3.25 or higher and an average GPA of 3.5 or higher in the major.

Professor Rocco Rubini's scholarship investigates the evolution of Italian humanism (in literature, theatre, and thought) from the Renaissance to the 20th century, reclaiming transhistorical continuities between early and later phases of the Italian intellectual tradition - both within Italy and in wider European and American contexts of reception. He teaches and studies Petrarch, Machiavelli, Renaissance playwrights and theater practitioners (commedia dell'arte), Goldoni, Vico, De Sanctis, and Gramsci, among others, to rethink the distinctive contribution of Italian letters to the making and unmaking of our ongoing "modernity."
